# Jones Photo historic slide show packs the house

On May 21st the 7th Street Theatre was packed with one of the largest crowds we've seen in a long time — 650 people! This was the first-ever public showing of photos from the Jones Photo Historical Collection — on the big screen. Approximately 240 historic photos from this area were shown, categorized by such subjects as timber, lumber production, theaters, hotels, shopping, bridges, seafood production, cities, disasters and more. The slides were chosen by a committee consisting of Tom Quigg, Terri Middleton, Barb Caskey, Dann Sears, John Larson, Howard Giske, Lane Youmans and Mickey Thurman, who all spent several months putting it together.


The slide show presentation was organized and narrated by local businessman Tom Quigg. Twenty-five members of the Jones family were present. Barb Caskey (4th generation Jones) narrated several slides showing pictures of her family.

After the show, the Jones website had a huge increase in hits and several photos were ordered. We received numerous com-

#### Two new board members



In January David and Ginger Akers were appointed to our board of directors. Both David and Ginger had already been actively involved in our movie committee — David is one of our projectionists and the man behind the Silver Screen Classic movie series. Ginger creates the posters for the series and helps with the accounting.

The Akers were first attracted to the 7th Street when Casablanca was shown in 2004. Ginger heard about it on the radio and since it

was David's favorite movie they thought they'd go. Little did they know that within a few years they'd be roped into helping run the theatre.

David's goal is to show as many old movies as the theatre will allow him, in order to continue the restoration and maintenance of the theatre. He states, "I want as many people as possible to enjoy movies in a classic style." Ginger wants to help the theatre to be the premier historic theatre for Grays Harbor. She says, "I want as many people as possible to see the beauty of the theatre and to recognize all the hard work that goes into maintaining it."

David is a computer programmer for Crown Distributing, and Ginger is a senior toan specialist for The Bank of the Pacific. We are very happy to have both of them on the board — they are a huge help and a lot of fun.

## New fire alarm system

A new fire alarm system was recently installed in the 7<sup>th</sup> Street. This is an "addressable" system, meaning every smoke and heat detector and manual pull station has its own identifiable location. When any one of them is actuated and an alarm signal is sent through to the Central Receiving Station (CRS) monitoring our system, it also notifies them and the Hoquiam Fire Department of the exact location of the problem. This type of system is mandatory in any new installation and takes the guess work out of "Where are we going?" for the fire department.

In order to avoid placing numerous smoke detectors in the large auditorium area, there were two "beam detectors" installed on either side of the auditorium. These devices have a unit on one end that projects a beam to a receiving unit on the other end. If that beam is interrupted by smoke, it automatically activates an alarm signal to the CRS. There is also one of these systems located in the lobby area.

This new fire alarm system came about when Paul Dean, Assistant Fire Chief, was reviewing the plans for the new stage renovation and fire curtain installation. Paul requested that the board raise funds to install a fire alarm system. His concern was "that in case of a fire somewhere in the theater during the night, we would not know about it until it was too late and could face loss of this grand historic piece of Hoquiam as well as all the work, time and money many people have poured into it. I not only see the theater at risk, but the entire block of structures surrounding it in the event of an out of control fire at the theater."

Paul further states, "The building is now equipped with what I consider to be a great fire alarm system. Although the building is not 'fireproof' it does have an early warning system to notify us within 90 seconds of something occurring there and aide us in preventing further loss. As I stated at a recent board meeting I attended, I applaud the 7<sup>th</sup> Street Theater board for stepping up to the plate and finding the money to install this system to protect what so many people have invested into."

The fire alarm system cost was \$90,000 which was paid for by funds remaining from a 2009 State appropriation and theatre savings.
